### G. Landscape and Garden

BFS to a new landscaping company, A.C. Parsons, for 2015. The decision has been made to address insurance and other needs. Parsons provides a much more flexible team, providing Workman's Compensation and liability insurance for all employees. Rhododendrons from Seal Harbor will arrive and be placed in the holding garden. Neil wondered if a program might be developed about the rhododendrons and their propagation so that eventually people might purchase them.

#### H. Facilities

Dave offered a report that included information about the winter weather and its affects on the building. The exterior of the road-facing side of the cape will require attention due to damage from ice dams. Snow and ice removal damaged the boxwoods and terrace garden trellises. Restorative pruning and trellis repair has been performed.

Deb Andrews completed a spring cleaning of the Farrand wing.

Work to do to restore and maintain the Farrand wing and the cape includes:

Entrance garden restoration and repair (quote in hand - \$19.4K)

Step fence replacement and repair (quote in hand -\$7.7K)

Cape and Farrand wing painting and window caulking

Rear of Farrand wing restoration (to be quoted)

Cape door replacement (to be quoted)

Shed Stabilization(need to investigate solution for water problem that is contributing to settling), repair, painting and staining Barn water damage repair, painting and staining

Greenhouse repair

Farrand wing accessible door area water damage

# Landscape needs:

Tree survey and cabling evaluation needs repeating this year and annually

Stewartia needs shaping and Sargent Cherry pruning needed to clear the roof

Donated cherry tree removal from behind terrace garden to be done by Tom

Hydrangea to be pruned by A.C. Parsons - last done in 2010

Bird bath needs repair by Lunaform. Isabel was asked to follow up with Phid.

Pruning generally out of control - not enough resources to correct and maintain. It was suggested that a pruning workshop or workshops be developed with students and mentors performing practical exercises at Garland Farm

#### I .Exhibitions

Lois spoke of progress to date: the herbarium is progressing and being scanned. Scott described the vouchers as seeming to be 3D. Lois selected each voucher to be viewed this summer; this year's exhibition features the canopy of Farrand's landscape architecture of the garden. The barn will be filled with new vouchers and a brochure and plant list will be available. Isabel asked that it include mention of native and non-native examples. The work is Berkeley's first digitization, now they are digitizing the collection of John Muir. They said that Farrands' collection was notably beautiful, organized, and complete. Neil wondered if vouchers that overlap with plants at Garland Farm be might noted; Isabel asked that mention be made of the items checked by the taxonomist at UMO.

## VI. President's Report

Scott described the re-structure of the board meetings: in the past there were four, now three. Needed information is in minutes so that board members unable to attend can participate fully. Spring meeting is for new board members to become familiar with structure and work and to suggest others who might join on account of their strengths; orientation is focus. Next board meeting in August allows for emphasis of different proposals for discussion. Last board meeting of year will include answering the question, *How to prioritize the needs*, and new ideas?

#### VII. New Business

A. The Mount Desert Elementary School/Beatrix Farrand Society Education Proposal.

Mike and Dave described and outlined a display board of Growing Gardens, Growing Minds, currently in progress at MDES.

There is a need for on-the-island opportunities for young people to work outdoors and be productive. Mentors would be available for young people, making them available to local people who aren't able to afford contract gardeners. This would provide summer work employment for young people.

**Target population** is 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders at MDES who have an interest in gardening **Program Start and Duration** Last week of June (last student day projected for 2016 is June 9)

Two half-days a week for eight weeks (half days would be a combination of workshops at Garland Farm and hands on time in the garden either at Garland Farm or at that of a homeowner

All sessions would include a group setting

### Challenges

Potential ability to meet an educational need but may not meet the need of parents working full time. Alternative programs such as Camp Beech Cliff, Harbor House, Neighborhood House and COA's Growing Season Program offer up to full day programs (8-5 at HH, 9-4 for CBC and NH, including before and after program child-care (at COA) and scholarships

Program development resources to develop the curriculum and workshop content, identify homeowner gardens for hands on experience and promotional materials, upfront expenditures are required

Program administration and workshop leadership resources will require ongoing funding unless the ongoing program is fully supported by tuition paid by the student learners.

Next Steps - Consensus was that BFS should proceed with exploring the program concept with a final decision to be made at the October 2015 board meeting

#### B. Carriage Roads Monograph

Description of the work of John D Rockefeller Jr. and Beatrix Farrand in minutes from October. Progress exists in this area and further details will be forth coming.

Proposal includes \$20,000, William Rieley and Roxanne Brouse to come this summer and to return next year to do a lecture about the book. This book would be completely different from anything that exists.

### C. BFS Achievement Lecture

Julia Leisenring is responsible for this event. Laurie Olin, the award recipient and lecturer, is finding time to come to BFS and is tailoring his talk to the Society. Special arrangements have been made at the Seacoast Mission to accommodate 100 seats and in another room that seats 40-50 people, a simulcast will occur. Portico provides roof so no additional tent is needed.

# D. 2015 Seminar/Tour August 2nd

Dennis Bracale originated last year's tour and has graciously agreed to lead one again this summer: East Asian Design Influences on Mount Desert Island

Samuel C. Morse, professor of fine arts and Asian languages and culture at Amherst College, will speak on the topic of collecting as a reflection of the scholar, changing view of nature in the garden

Dennis will speak about ideas in East Asian landscape design and as an introduction to the following four places on the tour:

Garland Farm, Ned and Lily Johnson, Abby Rockefeller Garden, Dennis Bracale property, return to Garland Farm for reception. Approx. 12:30-7:00- limited to around 40 people.

Johnson house - eclectic, not East Asian, collection of East Asian art (part of East Asian garden)

Rockefeller Garden - East Asian art in home and brought out into the garden. How does it relate to the park or the garden? How does it reflect East Asian point of view?

Dennis Bracale property - East Asian modernist house, inner and outer spaces have all been made with an eye to the view

Garland Farm -

Mary Roper will attend the tour; so that at the Johnsons' and Bracale's houses, two groups will be formed.

A meeting to follow the Board Meeting was scheduled to discuss who would be invited and what will be charged.

Intent is to reach out to people who have the capacity to substantially contribute to BFS. Meant to offer opportunity to see gardens not open to public. Requested 250.00, but many paid 500.00 last year; total raised was \$25,000.00. Goal this year is \$20,000.
